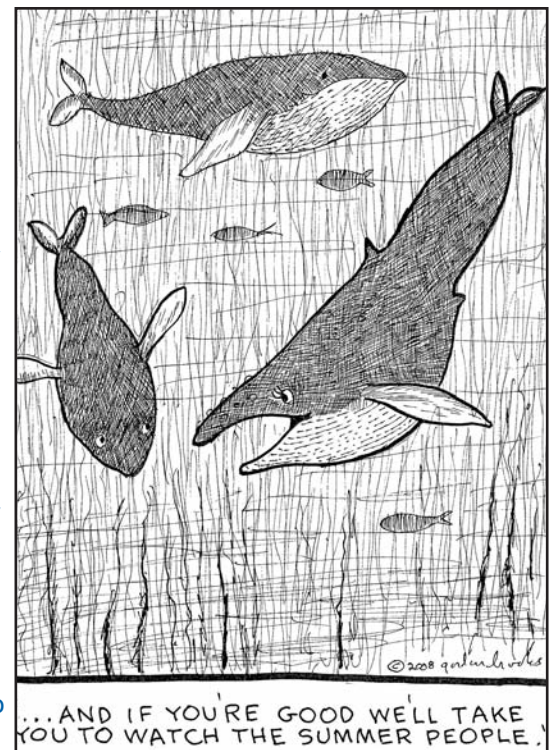
Everyone who visits the Aquarium comes away with a memory of an "up close and personal" meeting with one of our many fascinating residents. This is the special season to explore our Aquarium: a microcosm of Cape Cod water... from kettle ponds to brackish marsh to the marine ecosystems of Cape Cod Bay.

Did you know that Myrtle, our legendary Diamondback Terrapin, who has her own aquarium, is about 17 years old? She was found by Nancy Church as one of two eggs in a nest that had been destroyed by predators. Myrtle especially savors her morning 'power walks' around the Aquarium that both build her muscles and give her a lot of to think about!

Since early September the Tidal Pool has been home to two Shame-faced Crabs, caught by Chatham fisherman and marine biologist Cameron Smith in his dredging net. The Shame-faced Crab lives in ocean water 30-40' deep and therefore is rarely seen. According to our Senior Aquarist, Doug Smith, this unusual crab is doing well, feeding in the shallow depths of the tidal pool.

Great favorites in the Tidal Pool are the skate and the flounder, perhaps because their ability to camouflage themselves makes them great finds when they suddenly appear. The Blue Lobster is exhibiting very showy behavior in his new 120 gallon aquarium, no longer trying to hide himself under rocks.

Each marine resident has a unique story to share, especially with the visitor who takes the time to look.

Meet Our New Trustee: Betsy Waters Harrison



Betsy Harrison retired in January 2008 as the president and CEO of the Genesee Country Village & Museum, one of the nation's largest living history museums. The museum is located outside Rochester, NY and consists of an historic village

containing 57 buildings as well as the Genesee Country Nature Center, John L. Wehle Art Gallery and Silver Base Ball Park. Betsy held that position for seven years and had also served on the Museum's Board of Trustees for three years, serving on the executive, strategic planning and finance committees. Prior to that, she had been president and CEO of Career Development Services for 17 years, a not-for-profit human resource and career consulting educational organization, also located in Rochester, NY.

While living in Rochester, Betsy was very involved in the Rochester community and served on a variety of boards. A past board member of the Mid Atlantic Association of Museums and the Museum Association of New York, she continues to serve on the board of the WNY community bank, the Bank of Castile, as well as on its parent company board, Tompkins Financial Group (located in Ithaca, NY). She has a B.A. in Political Science and an M.P.A., Masters in Public Administration.

Betsy and her husband John are now living in the East Dennis home she's been coming to since she was a child. They have been CCMNH members for years, having brought their two daughters to visit the Museum many times when they were children.

We know the CCMNH will benefit from Betsy's years of experience in the museum and non-profit world. She is an enthusiastic fan of our Museum and we look forward to working with her. Welcome, Betsy!

Around the Museum with Todd Kelley, Aquarist and Field Guide



An out-of-state couple came into the Aquarium asking about seeing screech owls and woodcocks. They were birders and as many birders do, they were focused on specific birds to find.

I talked with them and gave some options but failed to consider our own South Trail as one. So I went over to the Lee Baldwin South Trail where screech owls and woodcocks could be, and was reminded of what a splendid and diverse short walk it is. After crossing the foot bridge over the Stony Brook, one enters a beech forest where downy and hairy woodpeckers vocally compete (downy fledged this year from one of the beech trees here). Some bees set up a hive in another beech tree close by this summer too. If you continue on you will enter a mature white oak and pitch pine forest where the pines are tall, straight and large. Here I was warned by chipmunk's cheeky "chuck" chirp and the busy scampering about preparing food stores for the winter. Here is also where northern flicker's repeated "clear" call let me know whose home it is as well. Some of the big pines have blown over and are allowing for a natural succession to take place. The pines that remain are a place to be looking for great horned owls in the afternoon. There are three benches along the way that offer different scenic respites to look, listen and wonder if one likes. On the backside of the property there are large black oaks along with younger tupelos and red maples at the brook's edge and an amazing stand of very large beech trees directly across the Stony Brook Valley Preserve completing this wonderfully diverse micro-habitat of a mature Cape forest. All you have to do is remember to take a little time and walk across the street.

Meet our 2010 KidSummer Director Barbara Knoss



As Nancy Church, 2009 KidSummer Director, received a grant to work at Waquoit Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve, the Museum is delighted to welcome Barbara Knoss as Kidsummer Director for 2010.

Barbara taught in a rural school in Minnesota for thirty-five years. This school had a state designated school forest of thirty acres and schoolchildren from kindergarten through 6th grade were involved in taking care of this forest with class projects. "They were taught environmental education before it became popular. It was a natural curriculum integration and connection to their rural upbringing," Barbara remembers.

A thirteen-year summer resident on the Cape, she now lives in Dennisport. Having raised her own children to love the outdoors, Barbara feels that the special Cape environment gives children the opportunity to get outside, to discover and make connections with the natural world. To her our Museum is a very special historic place, still here after a half-century and promoting ever new opportunities for children to experience the Cape. We are very fortunate to have Barbara as our 2010 KidSummer Director and know that the children attending KidSummer next year will be sharing her mantra, "Nothing beats fresh air!"

Do You Know....Jim Dudac and Todd Kelley, Our Aquarists?

A native of Southington, CT, Jim received his Associates Degree in Theology at Highland Hall Preparatory Seminary and a BA in Business from St. Michael's College. In 1968 he enlisted in the Navy and upon discharge received a Masters Degree in Education under the GI Bill. Jim taught elementary school for 28 years in Cheshire, CT, sharing his life-long love of nature and animals with his students.

In 1998 he moved to the Cape and joined the Senior AmericaCorps. For two years he volunteered at the Marine Biological Laboratories in Woods Hole, working with water maintenance and aquarium upkeep... specialties that brought him to the Museum in 2002.

At that time there were 12 displays. Today there are 25 displays. With a dramatically improved filtration system and support of "an awfully good team," Jim foresees further improvements to make the Aquarium easier to maintain in the future. His special joy is the interior design of the individual aquariums, arranging rocks and plants as a work of art.

Jim's goal is to have a visiting professor admire the sophistication of the Aquarium and at the same time have a visiting child say, "I could make an aquarium like this!"

From the glowing comments Museum volunteers and staff are hearing, Jim's hope is being realized right now!

Many of you already know Todd Kelley, having tapped his impressive knowledge of the natural world during field guide walks here at the Museum and through his regular contributions to *Tidings*. A Museum volunteer since late 2005, his role here has recently expanded - he is our new aquarist aka "critter feeder." Todd also chairs the Museum's Stewardship Advisory Committee.

Growing up in Chatham, Todd graduated with the Monomoyick class of 1979. (A family tradition... his father graduated with the class of 1950.) He lives in Chatham with his parents who, while not historians, are "keepers of communal knowledge and history."

Todd left the Cape in 1983 and was back and forth between Georgia and Cape Cod, then Florida and Cape Cod. Eventually he settled in Florida doing 16th century living history for ten years. He became known as "The Timucuan," personifying a 16th century indigenous Florida Indian of North Central Florida and culminating in *Currents of Time: "The River's First People"*, an exhibit at the Museum of Science and History in Jacksonville in 1997.

Now Todd has come full circle and has returned home to his own people and history as Kelley Trailblazer. He is also the Park Interpreter at Nickerson State Park during the summer.

It's no surprise to hear that he likes to walk in the woods and listen in silence. We (and our "critters") are glad to have him with us!

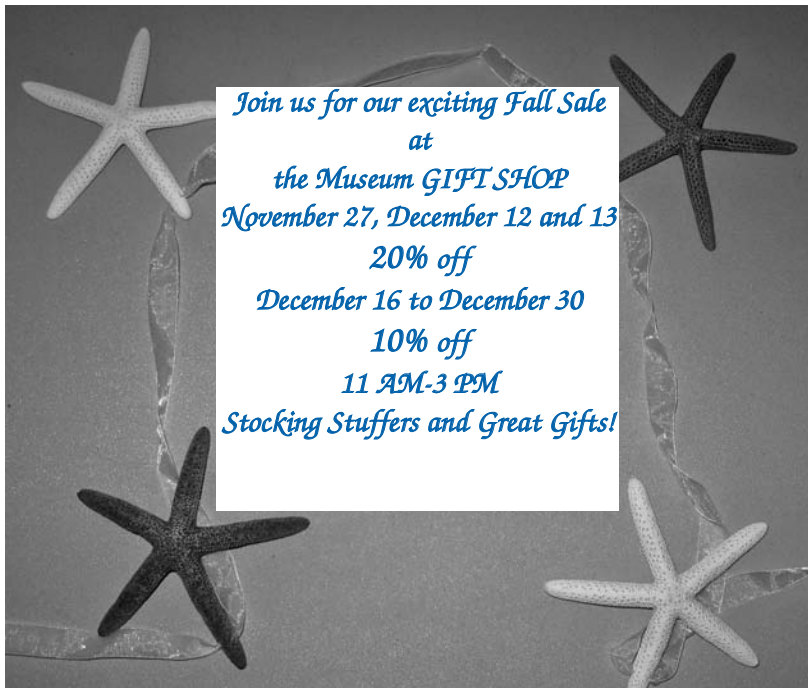
